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About the Student Work and Service Program (SWASP)

The Community Service Component of SWASP is a unique program that serves post-secondary students and nonprofit organizations. SWASP enables students to work in their home community during the summer, develop transferable skills, explore career interests and earn both a tuition voucher and a weekly stipend. SWASP students help nonprofit community groups improve the quality of life in communities across Newfoundland and Labrador.

This program is delivered by the Community Sector Council Newfoundland and Labrador (CSC) and funded by Service Canada. Voucher payments to post secondary institutions are administered by the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador.

This year by the numbers

Students

- ◆ 299 students placed
- ♦ 71% of students from rural NL
- ♦ 36% were recent graduates
- ♦ 64% were in post-secondary

Sponsors

- ♦ **285** organization sponsors
- ♦ 34% have no staff
- ♦ 47% have 5 or fewer staff

Students learned

SWASP Placement Ratings

Feedback collected from students and sponsors at various phases of their placement allows us to gauge how the placements impact participants and their perception of the program itself. Feedback was collected from 100% of sponsors and students in 2012, yielding very positive results.



100%

96%

of placements were in a student's home community



95%

of students rated SWASP as Good or Excellent

Impact on Students

Students complete surveys to help us understand how the SWASP program impacted them over the eight weeks.

As a result of SWASP:

- ♦ 92% felt they were making an impact on their community
- ♦ 94% think their placement will count as relevant work experience
- ♦ 88% learned skills that they will find useful in the future
- ♦ 86% plan to stay in contact with their sponsor organization
- ♦ 97% say they were treated as equals in the workplace
- ♦ 96% felt appropriately supported by their supervisor

Without SWASP:


- ♦ Only 54% say they would have gotten a job in their home community
- Only 17% felt they would have found a job related to their field of study
- ♦ 77% would not have worked for a nonprofit this past summer
